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Welcome & Important Message to Mission Trip Leaders

You are an answer to prayer and the key to the success of what God desires to do through your group in Mexico. We are deeply grateful for your willingness to serve God in this special way. Be prepared to be deeply challenged and blessed! God has raised you up as the leader of your group and therefore, you play the most important role! Remember to have a Christ-like attitude and be a good example for all to follow. Be excited about the trip and let your enthusiasm overflow to others. God has positioned you in a place to be greatly used by Him. It could very well be possible that what you do over the next months could be the most important work you'll do this year. God, for some reason, has chosen to greatly touch Americans while they're in Mexico, and also the lives of the Mexicans through your ministry as Americans. It's a win, win, situation. Your group will be able to hear and see things that they're unable to hear and see in the states. Be prepared to see God greatly work in your group's lives. Enjoy it, pray for it, and do your part in allowing God to get as many people to Mexico as possible.

In order to be a successful mission trip leader, it is imperative that you acquaint yourself with each section of the Leader's Manual. Whether you're a veteran with us or a newcomer, please read each section carefully. So grab a cup of coffee or tea, find a comfortable chair, and read over this manual carefully. The time you invest here will save you a lot of time and headaches later on.

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Chapter 1 - Getting Started: First Things First!

How to Plan & Organize Your Mission Trip

Following is a very helpful guide that will walk you through the necessary steps for planning and organizing your mission trip.

1. Spread the Word about Your Mission Trip as Soon As possible

Talk with Your Pastor - Ask his blessing and help in promoting your mission trip. Ask him if he would promote and talk about the trip from the pulpit.

Put Announcements in Your Church Bulletin - Announce it up front, promote it from the pulpit, call people, talk to people; ask for stories of people who have already gone on a short-term mission trip, do a skit, do whatever you can to get the word out.

Put a Sign-up Sheet in the Lobby of Your Church - Put out a nice, attractive, sign-up sheet in a well-known spot and encourage people to sign up if they're interested in going. Your first step is to throw wide the net and gather all who have any interest.

Put Together an Information Trip Packet - Along with the sign-up sheet, if you have the capability, put together a mission trip packet that answers as many questions as you can think of. This will provide information prior to your information meeting to better inform those interested. Our brochures will help if you'd like to use them.

Set a Date for an Information Meeting - About one month after you have started promoting the trip, have an information meeting to inform those interested and to answer everyone's questions. Some issues to cover would be finances, food prep, VBS prep, trip schedule, meeting schedule for trip planning, etc.).

Announce the Procedure for Group Registration - As part of your meeting, let those at the information meeting know how to get on board. It works well to set a \$25 or more non-refundable registration fee for registration. For some reason, money firms up decisions.

Establish the Total Mission Trip Price - Take into consideration travel, insurance, food, and other costs. In addition, consider the three following factors in planning your trip that will affect your trip cost:

1. **Food costs** - We provide an option (highly recommended) of eating the Sunday evening meal and the noon meals at the church you will be serving at Monday-Thursday. This is a wonderful way to save time, money, and get to know the people and culture of Mexico. It's a popular hit among all mission teams. A charge of \$4.00 per person, per meal is the cost of this highly recommended option. This amount also includes enough money so the Mexicans who are ministering with you can eat with you as well. 2. **Work projects** - No need to worry about this, we will provide the building materials for you out of your group fees. We also have most tools you'll need too. However, if you want to do a major construction project, you will need to raise additional funds. [Click for more](#)
3. **Ministry costs** - You will have some costs for Bibles, tracts and Vacation Bible School supplies that you will want to take into consideration. [Click for more](#)

2. Establish Your Mission Team

Set Up Your Meeting Schedule for Group Preparation & Training - You will normally need a minimum of about 6-8 meetings to allow adequate time for V.B.S and ministry prep. Don't forget your spiritual prep (the most important of all). Vacation Bible School Prep - You will be doing a total of five V.B.S.'s during your week in Mexico. Your V.B.S. crafts will need to be packaged in groups of ten and each put in one larger bag (snacks **do not** need to be packaged in groups of ten). This is a very important detail that if not followed can cause problems during the V.B.S. time as we will be dividing the children at the V.B.S. into groups of ten in order to maintain control. This is the best way we have found to maintain crown control. Also, if you can bring some sports items for the playtime during V.B.S., it would be helpful. [VBS's](#)

Meal Prep - An option to consider if you don't have a cook, is to designate a kitchen and meal coordinator to oversee the meals and kitchen. Divide the group into food teams and allow them to plan the meals (with the oversight of the kitchen and meal coordinator). Some meals can be pre-cooked in the States and then prepared in Mexico. Make sure you have healthy meals as you will be exerting extra energy while on your trip. Take into consideration the option of eating the Sunday evening meal and Monday-Thursday lunches at the church you will be serving at. This will cut down on the amount of meals to prepare. Also, many groups like to eat out at least once during the week. [More on meal help](#)

Spiritual Prep - Don't neglect this important area. Without right hearts, we have little to offer. 6. Additional Items to Address

Daily Devotionals - During the week while in Mexico, we encourage you to have group devotions each day. We as the site missionaries will do a Cultural & Ministry Orientation meeting Sunday morning, and a Farewell Meeting on Thursday evening. You will be responsible for doing the group devotionals Monday - Thursday. Your group will be in charge of your own music and teaching for your daily devotions.

Traveling in Mexico - Traveling in Mexico carries no more inherent risk than in the U.S. A custom that is used in Mexico which is helpful, and at the same time confusing, is the way they use their left blinkers. If you are on an open stretch of highway and following a slow vehicle, they will often put on their left turn signal. This tells you that no one is coming and you can pass them. (But be careful here, they might actually be going to turn left!) A valid driver's license from the U.S. is valid in Mexico. While serious crime is low in Mexico, thievery does exist so leave your valuables locked up, or out of sight.

Group tee-shirts - If you would like, you can design your own tee-shirts for your mission trip. This can be very valuable and acts as a great keepsake and reminder of God's work in each person's life.

Entering Mexico - When entering, or at different checkpoints, you might be asked some

questions. It's possible they might ask you what your purpose is in Mexico. Tell them that you're coming as a tourist. Mexico has no real law for handling mission groups, so it's best to come under their recognized category of tourist. [More on entering Mexico](#)

Sleeping Bag & Pillow - The bunk beds have wood bottoms and foam cushions. However, each person will need their own sleeping bag and pillow. [More on sleeping accommodations](#)

Miscellaneous Costs to Consider

Making Your Mission Trip More Affordable

In order to keep mission fees as affordable as possible, we allow teams to purchase some of their own items needed for their stay at the mission base and for their ministries.

Our hope is that while you're on the ministry base with us in Mexico, you feel at home. Our mindset is that "Mi casa es tu casa" (My house is your house). We don't operate like a hotel service; we basically loan you the base during your time here. The following items will save you money if you buy them instead of us providing them.

Taking this in mind, here are some additional items to consider for your mission trip.

Food

In order to make your trip as affordable as possible we allow groups to take care of some of their own meals (we provide large furnished kitchens with all the cooking utensils you'll need for this). Food is not covered in your cost. [For more on food click here](#)

Meal prep can be very easy if you consider the following options:

- Some mission teams have each person bring their favorite box of cold cereal for the week in Mexico. Milk and fruit can be brought with you, or purchased here in Mexico. This provides a quick, healthy breakfast with little costs or work.
- As mentioned earlier, we provide an option (highly recommended) of eating the Sunday evening meal and the noon meals (Monday-Thursday) at the church you will be serving at.

- The remainder of the meals can be prepared at the mission base or you can eat out at some local taco stands. The mission base kitchens are very accommodating (each has two stoves, two refrigerators, large countertop work areas, large serving bar & more).
- It is best to purchase your main food items in the States before crossing the border (costs are less and selection is better). Following is a recommended shopping center close to the border. Items like fruit, bread, and milk can be purchased locally in Mexico if you wish. [More on Grocery Shopping Help](#)

Cleaning Items

- Several liquid hand soaps (anti-bacterial)
- Small bottle dishwashing liquid
- Couple scrubber pads for pots and pans

Items for Meals at the Mission Base

- Napkins
- Paper plates (we recommend using paper plates, bowls, cups & etc. for eating, this cuts down on work & time)
- Paper bowls
- Paper cups
- Plastic eating utensils

Misc. Items

- Small bathroom trash bags (10 gallon)
- Large trash bags (40 gallon)
- Paper towels for kitchen and bathrooms
- Toilet Paper
- Hand Soap
- Baby wipes for cleaning hands after V.B.S. etc. (put in vans)

First Aid Kit & Medicines - (To carry with you). We have first aid kits at the ministry base for use as well.

- Neosporin
- Hydrogen peroxide
- Tylenol
- Imodium AD
- Sun block

Purified Drinking Water in Mexico

We will have at the Ministry Base 5-gallon bottles of purified drinking water for your use. These bottles can be filled with purified water at all grocery stores for less than \$1.00 each. It will be your group's responsibility to purchase your own water. There is no need to bring purified water with you unless you would feel more comfortable doing so.

Work Projects

Part of your mission team fees will be used for your construction projects. However, if your group wants to do a major project, we ask that you raise addition funds for this. [More on work projects](#)

Vehicle Insurance

Although vehicle insurance is not required in Mexico, you might want to have it just in case. We strongly recommend that you purchase insurance prior to your trip. Purchasing insurance at the border can be costly and time-consuming.

Bibles

Please bring complete Bibles containing both the Old and New Testaments. (1 case of Bibles for mission teams of 20 or less). These can be ordered from American Bible Sales (Lockman Foundation), Tel: 714-879-2283, 800-535-5131, or go to their website at AmericanBibleSales.com.

Important note: Be sure to select their case price as they're much cheaper. This is a new version of the Bible called the NBLH (Nueva Biblia Latinoamerica de Hoy) which is equivalent to the NASB in English (New American Standard Bible). This is the Spanish version our ministry likes best.

Evangelism Tracts

We have several free tracts from our ministry you can print. Some of the tracts are in a cartoon format. Because many here in Mexico lack the ability to read, a cartoon format really grabs and holds their attention. Make sure you order all tracks in Spanish!

VBS Snacks & Crafts

We will need you to bring some crafts and snacks for your children's ministries. We provide the VBS program, puppets, media equipment, etc., but we'll need you to cover the crafts and snacks. [Click here for more](#)

Pastor Offering

We'll give you the option of blessing the pastor of the church you'll be serving at with an offering at the end of the week. This is voluntary but recommended because most pastors have to work in Mexico to get by. Because your pastor will be with you most of the week, he won't be able to do his regular job to provide a living for himself and his household. A suggested offering amount would be between \$150 - \$250 U.S. Dollars. This offering can be taken up while in Mexico giving all your team members a chance to participate.

Chapter 2 - Registration & Mission Trip Fees

How to Register Your Mission Team

We offer mission trips year around. However, please contact us first to check on mission trip date availability.

How to register & confirm your mission team spot

1. **Fill out the Online Electronic Registration Form Field on the Registration Page of our Website.**

Then click the "Submit Button" at the bottom, and we'll receive your Online Electronic Registration Form electronically.

2. **Pay your Registration Fee of \$250**

We provide two easy ways to pay your registration fee:

Option One: Send in your Team Registration fee of \$250 (non-refundable & separate fee from mission trip fees)

Option Two: Pay your Registration Fee via PayPal or pay using credit card (opens to PayPal from which to pay by credit card). [Click for registration page](#)

Financial confirmations are due two weeks from the time of submitting the Online Registration Form located on the lower part of this page.

Note: For your convenience, the \$250 Registration Fee is the only funds due until one month prior to your mission trip dates.

How to Pay Mission Trip Fees

Our Goal Regarding Mission Trip Fees

To keep fees as low as possible, so no one is hindered from going on a mission trip, and to make payment of fees as simple as possible!

We Make Paying Mission Trip Fees Simple and Easy

We operate on a "Good Faith" basis and don't ask for numerous deposits and payments throughout the year. We just ask for a Registration Fee to hold your spot and then allow you to pay your mission trip fees when you get close to departure. This makes it easy on you and alleviates a complicated payment process throughout the year.

Because we operate on a "Good Faith" basis, we ask that you follow through with your commitment with your mission trip as cancellations leave us with empty spots in our calendar that means lost ministry for our Lord.

What Mission Trip Fees Cover

One of the unique factors that separates "Go Missions to Mexico" from other mission organizations is that we use about 30% of a mission team's fees for the building materials used for their work projects. As a result, mission teams who serve with us truly make a huge difference in helping a needy church with their facilities & ministries. Most other mission organizations charge extra for this in addition to mission trip fees.

Items covered by fees:

- Construction Materials for work projects
- Tools for work projects
- Lodging (large meeting rooms, dining halls, bathrooms, showers, play area, campfire pit & more)
- Large furnished kitchens for preparing meals
- Vacation Bible School Program
- Media Equip.
- Ministry items for your ministries (puppets, puppet show scripts and setup, boom boxes, video projector & screen, evangelistic movies, Vacation Bible School Story videos), and more!
- Coordination of all ministries and work projects! We'll have everything ready when you arrive so you can focus on ministry!
- Our on-site assistance to guide and help you each step of the way! We'll accompany and assist you throughout your time in Mexico!
- We do this all for a very low cost! We don't want anyone to be hindered by costs as we know what God can do in, and through, the lives of mission team members. We, ourselves, are missionaries as a result of bringing mission teams to Mexico and seeing how God can use them.

Fees for teams of 20 or more (not including pre-school)

- Adults/Teens (ages 13 & up) \$225 per person
- Children (ages 6 - 12) \$200 per person
- Pre-school (ages 0-5) Free

Fees for teams of 19-15 (not including pre-school)

- Adults/Teens (ages 13 & up) \$250 per person
- Children (ages 6 - 12) \$225 per person
- Pre-school (ages 0-5) Free

Fees for teams of 14-10 (not including pre-school)

- Adults/Teens (ages 13 & up) \$300 per person
- Children (ages 6 - 12) \$275 per person
- Pre-school (ages 0-5) Free

Note: Unfortunately, we are only able to accommodate mission teams with at least 10 people (not counting pre-school). Because mission teams serving with our ministry carry out various ministries like; Vacation Bible Schools, Home Visitation, Community Outreaches, Building Projects for needy churches etc., smaller teams don't provide enough people or finances to carry these out. We do, however, provide excellent resources for making your team larger and easy payment of fees for your convenience.

How to Pay Mission Trip Fees

1. One month prior to your mission trip departure please pay 1/2 of your mission trip fees based on the size of your mission team (please see pricing chart above).

Building Projects

Helping Needy Churches

During the mornings, about half of your mission team will normally be involved in some church related work projects until lunch time. The rest of your team (those who choose to do so) will be involved in prayer/visitation ministry.

Because there is such poverty in our area of Mexico, most churches struggle to have even the basic facilities for their people. Most churches even lack the finances to support their pastors. Many pastors, therefore, are forced to work full or part time jobs in order to get by. To be able to come alongside these churches and help them with their facilities meets a great need for the people of Mexico.

Where Do Funds Come From?

Materials for your construction projects are purchased with your mission trip fees. As a result, there's no need to worry about having to raise additional funds for your work projects!

In the event your mission team might want to do a large project, we would ask you to raise additional funds for this.

What If Our Team Is Not Skilled?

No problem! The Mexicans from the church you'll be serving at will oversee and guide you. As long as you don't mind getting a little dirty, and have a willing heart, you don't need any skills whatsoever.

What If Some Don't Care to Work?

No problem! It's also good to know that if some are not able to work for whatever reason, they can choose the door to door evangelism/prayer/visitation ministry or are free to do something else. No one is forced to work. Everything is voluntary, and there are plenty of options for everyone.

We Offer All Kinds of Work Projects!

No need to worry about what you'll do, there's always work projects for everyone according to their desires. You'll also work alongside your Mexican Christians from the church during your work times. Generally, we let the Mexicans oversee the projects and we'll work along with them. If it's a wood construction project, then we'll generally oversee them.

Work projects range from light work to heavier work projects. For groups who have skilled workers, there are projects like roofing, sheet rock, and construction. Depending on the skill of your group, we'll have the work projects that are just right for your group.

Normally, we have a variety of jobs for groups to do so everyone can participate.

Here's a sample of the kinds of work projects your team can be involved in:

- Painting Projects
- Cement Work Projects
- Roofing Projects
- Large Building Projects
- Block Work Projects
- Stuccoing Projects
- Foundation Work Projects
- Digging Projects for Building Foundation Prep
- Carpentry Projects
- Electrical Projects
- Sheet Rocking Projects
- Cleaning Projects
- General Work Projects

For those who wish to continue working on the Work Projects after lunch, they are welcome to do so.

We Provide the Tools Needed!

No need to worry about bringing tools as we provide everything you'll need for your work projects. However, mission team members are welcome to bring their own personal tools if desired.

We Make All Arrangements for Work Projects Before Your Arrival!

No need to worry about what your work projects will be or about getting them lined out ahead of time as we'll take care of all that for you. We even provide the oversight and direction of all jobs, so if you don't have skilled laborers, you'll still be able to help out greatly. However, in the event you do have some skilled labor, we'll take that into consideration and use them in their gifted areas.

Your Mission Team is Greatly Needed!

We minister to around 150 churches in our area of Mexico. To be able to come alongside a needy church and help with their church buildings meets a great need and allows the church to better reach their communities for Christ. Our ministry is constantly helping new church plants and existing churches with their needs. We have many churches that beg us to send them a

mission team. However, we just don't have enough mission teams to go around. A mission team not only helps with a needy church's facilities but also strengthens them spiritually through the other ministries your mission team will do. Our area of Mexico is safe, and we've worked hard to make mission trips very affordable. Your mission trip fees even cover all materials for your work projects. Vacation Bible School Outreaches

Sunday and Wednesday evenings (Wed. Optional), and during the afternoons Monday -Thursday, your mission team will do Vacation Bible School Outreaches at the specially chosen church you'll be serving with for the week. The children will range in ages from 3-12. Often, the younger ones will be accompanied by their moms. Teenagers will often be involved as well or observe from a distance.

A Vacation Bible School is a great way to share the Gospel and disciple those who attend. We have carefully and prayerfully put together this VBS package and have seen it produce great results. It communicates key, step-by-step biblical truths and is fun and interesting at the same time.

Your group will do a total of 5 main VBS's on the following days:

Sunday Evening - 5:00pm

Monday Afternoon - 2:00pm

Tuesday Afternoon - 2:00pm

Wednesday Afternoon - 2:00pm

Thursday Afternoon - 2:00pm

Optional - Wednesday Evening Ministry- 6:00pm. If chosen, this VBS will have no snacks & crafts.

Below is more info on each part of the VBS:

Style of VBS

VBS in Mexico is different than in the states. We have found the best method is to have all the children together rather than trying to divide them up into age groups. Following are the reasons: (1) the older siblings are commanded to watch their younger siblings by their parents so these little family units cannot be broken up; (2) the children down here are harder to direct and work with, and; (3) there are generally not the facilities to accommodate a number of groups.

Game Time - 20 - 30 min.

Your group will play outside games with the children such as; jump rope, bean bag toss, ball tosses, duck duck goose, soccer, bubbles, face painting, frisbee games, baseball (with plastic bats and balls, etc.). You can organize your group into smaller groups which can be in charge of the various games happening. There won't be large group games where all the children will be involved in, but various, smaller games happening at the same time. The children usually will rotate and go from one game to the other as they please. After game time, make sure each group picks up their sports equipment as the children will often try to take it. This is a time to get to know the children and draw a crowd from the community. We would ask if you could, to bring some sports equipment with you for this time.

(There will be no play time for Sunday or Wednesday evening VBS's. These condensed VBS's will need to fit within the message time of the Adult Outreaches. VBS's on Sunday and Wednesday evening will last about 1 hour, so these VBS's will be a little shorter.)

Song Time - 15 min.

If your team is able (if not we can fill in for you) you will do about 4-5 children's Spanish songs. Several of these should be upbeat songs with motions, and several can be slower songs.

(There will be no song time for Sunday or Wednesday evening VBS's as children will have participated in the song time with the adult outreach and the VBS will need to fit within the message time of the adult outreach. VBS's on Sunday and Wednesday evening will last about 1 hour, so these VBS's will be a little shorter.)

Puppet Show - 15 min.

A big highlight of the V.B.S. is the puppet show. We have the puppets and the Spanish scripts. The scripts are on a cd and easy to follow. It basically involves voice recognition. Upon arrival, we'll show those in your team, who want to be involved in this area, how to do it.

The theme for the puppet teaching time is as follows:

VBS 1 - Rom. 3:23 "All have sinned and the problem of mankind." (Sunday)

VBS 2 - Rom. 6:23 "The wages of sin and the gift of salvation." (Monday)

VBS 3 - Jn. 3:16 "God's love for all and His gift of Jesus." (Tuesday)

VBS 4 - Rom. 5:8 "Christ's payment for our sins." (Wednesday)

VBS 5 - No memory verse or crafts and snacks (Wednesday Evening)

VBS 6 - Rom. 10:9 "Alter Call to receive Christ and be saved." (Thursday)

Testimonies - 5-10 min.

Two short testimonies geared towards children. Try to be brief (3-5 min.) and share something that God did in your life to draw you to Him when you were a child. [Click for more on sharing your testimony](#)

Memory Verses - 10 min.

After each Bible Story time, we will spend a few minutes teaching the children the Bible verses (Except Wednesday evening VBS). These verses are taught via puppets. The last day we will hand out prizes for those who can say from one to all the verses. If your team could bring some prizes for the memory verses it would be great (50-75 would be good). We'll talk more about what kinds of prizes at end of this section. If your team would like to include the verse in your crafts, here's the verses and version we use:

VBS 1 - Romanos 3:23 "Por cuanto todos pecaron y están destituidos de la gloria de Dios."

VBS 2 - Romanos 6:23 "Porque la paga del pecado es muerte, más la dádiva de Dios es vida eterna en Cristo Jesús nuestro Señor."

VBS 3 - Juan 3:16 "Porque de tal manera amó Dios al mundo, que ha dado a su hijo unigénito, para que todo aquel que en él cree, no se pierda más tenga vida eterna."

VBS 4 - Romanos 5:8 "Más Dios muestra su amor para con nosotros en que siendo aun pecadores Cristo murió por nuestros pecados."

VBS 5 - No memory verse for Wednesday evening VBS as the children will have just been given one to memorize during Wednesday afternoon's VBS.

VBS 6 - Romanos 10:9 "Si confiesas con tu boca que Jesús es el Señor y crees en tu corazón que Dios lo levantó de entre los muertos serás salvo."

Bible Story - 20 min.

This is done via DVD on a large screen TV. Because the children are more unruly in Mexico and harder to control, we find a Bible Story via DVD works best. We provide the movies, big screen TV for this part of the V.B.S.

The theme of the Bible Story teaching time is as follows:

VBS 1 - "Creation of Heavens and Earth" (Sunday)

VBS 2 - "Moses and the Ten Commandments" (Monday)

VBS 3 - "Life and Miracles of Jesus" Part I (Tuesday)

VBS 4 - "Life and Miracles of Jesus" Part II (Wednesday)

VBS 5 - "Miracles of Elijah" (Wednesday Evening. No crafts or snacks) **Note: Wednesday evening ministry is optional. Please advise us if you will not be doing this.**

VBS 6 - "Crucifixion and Resurrection of Jesus" (Thursday)

Craft & Snack Time - 20 min.

This is an important time where your team's participation is important. The children are divided into groups of ten, with one or two people from your team attending them. You will need to bring crafts and snacks for at least 100 children (we will notify you if more are needed). Package the crafts in bags of 10 bags (snacks do not need to be packaged in bags of 10). We have discovered that by forming groups of 10, and having them sit on the floor, works best for crowd control. Each sack is for each group of ten children. Try to avoid candy and sweets for snacks.

Salvation Altar Call on the Last Day of VBS

The last VBS (Thursday), we'll present a clear salvation invitation for children to receive Christ. This will be the culmination and goal for all that has been done in the VBS's. It's a special time, and many will pray to receive Christ or recommit to Him.

Here are the verses we use in presenting the gospel:

Romanos 3:23 "Por cuanto todos pecaron y están destituidos de la gloria de Dios."

Romanos 6:23 "Porque la paga del pecado es muerte, más la dádiva de Dios es vida eterna en Cristo Jesús nuestro Señor."

Juan 3:16 "Porque de tal manera amó Dios al mundo, que ha dado a su hijo unigénito, para que todo aquel que en él cree, no se pierda más tenga vida eterna."

Romanos 5:8 "Más Dios muestra su amor para con nosotros en que siendo aún pecadores Cristo murió por nuestros pecados."

Romanos 10:9 "Si confiesas con tu boca que Jesús es el Señor y crees en tu corazón que Dios lo levantó de entre los muertos serás salvo."

Summary of What Items You'll Need to Bring for Your VBS Ministry

- Bring game things to play with children during the play time.
- Be prepared to sing some children's songs (If you need help let us know). For help with children's VBS songs consult our website for more help.
- Bring crafts and snacks for five VBS's with enough for 100 in each VBS.
- 50-75 prizes for those who memorize VBS verses.
- Come prepared to share 12 testimonies geared for children. [Click for more on sharing your testimony](#)

Craft Ideas

- **Coloring books** - You can photocopy pages, or purchase a Bible coloring book (preferably in Spanish) and have the children color them. Crayons needed.
- **Puppets** - Use paper lunch sacks and provide pieces for their mouths, ears, etc. Crayons are necessary for this craft.

- **Paper plate half-masks** - Beforehand, cut paper plates in half, punch holes by ears, and cut eye-holes and a slot for the nose. Let the kids color them and put rubber bands through the holes. They can wear the masks by putting the rubber bands around their ears.
- **Paper plate visors** - Beforehand, cut paper plates in half and punch a hole near each corner. Have the kids decorate them and tie a piece of pre-cut elastic through the holes to make a visor.
- **Crowns** - Trace a simple outline of the front of a crown onto tag board or other stiff paper. Cut them out and punch a hole at each end. Let the kids decorate them and put a piece of pre-cut yarn or elastic through each hole. To put the crown on, place on head and tie strings in back.

You can look on the Internet for other great ideas as well.

Snack Ideas

- Single serving of canned fruit/applesauce, pudding (don't forget spoons).
- Single-serving bags of chips.
- Single serving bags of peanuts.
- Single-serving boxes of raisins.
- Single serving cookies, or animal crackers.
- Granola bars individually wrapped Hostess/or similar treats.
- Graham crackers.
- Handi-Snacks (crackers and peanut butter, etc.)

It definitely works best if the snacks are individually wrapped and easily transported. It is often possible to get stores in your area to donate these types of items. Drinks for VBS are optional and up to the discretion and desire of each mission team.

VBS Prize Info

Given to children who can say from 1 to all memory verses. Prizes are a great way to reward those who have worked hard to hide God's word in their hearts. We'll give out varying kinds of prizes depending on how many verses the children can say. It is best to hand out the same kind of prize for the amount of verses memorized. For example; all who can say one verse would all get the same prize, etc. This helps with crowd control and cuts down on each child wanting a different prize (when working with large numbers of children crowd control becomes important).

Here are some ideas for prizes:

- **For saying 1 verse** - Pencil with a small coloring book or workbook leaflets (in Spanish please).

- **For saying 2-3 verses:** Rubber balls, small cars (boys) hair things (girls) crayons, party favors toys, bubbles, dollar store stuff, coloring books or workbook leaflets (in Spanish please).
- **For saying 4-5 verses:** Frisbees, jump ropes, soccer type balls, markers, coloring books (in Spanish please), small stuffed animals, etc.

Normally, we'll hand out about 40 prizes to those who can say 1 verse, about 25 for those who can say 2-3 verses and about 10 to those who can say all the verses. Of course, sometimes these numbers can vary if we have more children in the VBS. Any extra items are put into our prize cache and used when numbers are up at a VBS.

We would appreciate it, if you can get a hold of large amounts of coloring book type leaflets, pencils, or crayons, to bring them down. They work great for prizes for those who say 1-3 verses.

Thank you for your thoughtfulness, and we're looking forward to a great VBS with your team.

Church/Community Outreaches

Two nights during the week (Sunday & Wednesday, Wednesday is optional) you will do Church/Community Outreaches at the specially chosen church you'll be serving at. There will be two Church/Community Outreaches during the week (Sunday & Wednesday).

The first night (Sunday) you will take the children out for their first Vacation Bible School after your team's participation in front of the church. The other outreach night, (Wednesday), the children will be taken out just like on Sunday, however, they will be given a shortened version of VBS (less crafts and snacks).

Generally, the Church/Community Outreaches begin with songs (done by the church). After the song time, your group will be introduced. Your group will come to the front of the church and sing a couple songs, do a puppet show, and share a couple testimonies. Following, an evangelistic film will be shown via a video projector & big screen (we provide all this and the movie). After the film, or message, the pastor will wrap up the outreach.

If you could participate in the Church/Community Outreaches with the following items, it would make it really special. Don't worry about having everything perfect for your participation. Things are more casual in Mexico, and the folks will just be happy to have you.

Singing a Couple Spanish Songs

This will be for the church you'll be serving at for the week. It works out good to have someone who knows the songs well to sing into the microphone and have the rest of the group sing along. If singing a few songs is a problem for your group, don't worry, we can help out, it can be omitted or changed for a drama, or you can sing in English.

Puppet show

The adults love the puppet shows as well as the children. We have all the puppets, puppet stage, and scripts for this on cd. All you'll need to do is have some ready volunteers for a little practice after arriving here in Mexico.

Testimonies

At least two volunteers per Church/Community Outreach to share a brief testimony of how they came to Christ (total of 4 testimonies needed), or what He is doing in their lives. For more on what these testimonies should contain and how they need to be shared go to: [Giving Your Testimony](#)

Other Activities

If your group would like they can do dramas or whatever for the Church Outreaches. Just let us know of your plans and we'll work with you.

The church you'll be serving at will welcome you with wide open arms and trust you beyond belief. This is due in part to their trust in us as missionaries. Because we have been working in the area for about 18 years, we have developed many deep relationships with them.

If you have any questions regarding your outreach times, please feel free to talk with us.

Vacation Bible School

Sunday Evening - After your mission team's participation in the main part of the outreach, the children will be separated, and you'll do your first VBS. This VBS will be a little shorter than the main ones on Monday-Thursday afternoons. Sunday evening's VBS will not have a play time, and the songs will be reduced to just one or two. The VBS is a little shorter so that it fits within the time frame of the evangelistic movie we'll be showing to the adults.

Wednesday Evening - This Outreach is optional. If you choose to do it, the VBS time will be the same as Sunday's, however, with the exception of having no crafts or snacks.

Sharing Testimonies

Why Testimonies?

Testimonies are a wonderful way to communicate what God has done. It is real, it helps us relate to non-believers, it is interesting, and it cannot be argued against. It is one of our most vital tools in relating to non-Christians. Every believer should be able to tell their testimony in a short, condensed form. They should also be able to relate recent events of answered prayer or things God has done for them. This brings God to life before the non-believer.

During the week you are here, your group will have ample opportunity to share what God has done in their lives. Your Mexican brothers and sisters, and non-believers as well, will be excited to hear from you. It will allow you to be able to relate to them and take away the cultural barriers.

We like to have two testimonies at each event. Counting the church and VBS outreaches, your group will be sharing about 8 times. This makes a total of about 16 testimonies needed. Twelve of

your testimonies will be for children. If possible, try to make these testimonies refer to some event in your life when you were a child. This will help you identify with them better.

Following is some helpful advice for those giving their testimonies, and those who will be translating.

Preparation

- Write out your testimony. This could be one of the most important factors in giving a clear, concise, and impactful testimony. Often, people, especially teens, get nervous and forget what they want to say, or find themselves forgetting important parts. Writing it down helps to prevent this, and gives the interpreter a chance to see what is going to be said. We strongly recommend you write out your testimony.
- Back the testimony with prayer.
- Pray as you go.

Presentation

- Be definite, specific, and contemporary.
- Be careful of your terminology. Don't use generalization or ambiguous terms.
- Show concern for the one to whom you are testifying. Show interest in them.
- Remember this is a testimony of what Christ has done for you. This should show in your voice, actions, and facial expressions.
- Point to Jesus. Keep your testimony to the point. Five minutes is the maximum.

Content

- Begin with thanksgiving and praise, thanking God for the truth, the Word of God, for Christian service, for being able to serve Him, and for a true relationship with Him.
- Don't run down another person's belief. Tell of current answers to prayer.
- Tell of your relationship with Christ.
- Give a comparison of what you used to be like, and what has changed since the Savior came into your life.
- It's best to present a single spiritual truth rather than a rambling story of your life. Emphasize a point and then stop.
- Include something about the power of God, His love, mercy, and grace.

Considerations When Speaking Through an Interpreter

The speaker/interpreter relationship is a dependent partnership comparable to performing a duet. The following suggestions are offered to help speakers make a more successful presentation through an interpreter:

- Divide your material into short, meaningful sentences.

- Use simple everyday language. Avoid slang, which may be difficult to translate. Stay away from technical or specialized language.
- Talk to the audience. Remember, whether they understand you or not, you are speaking to them, not the interpreter. Speak loudly enough for the audience to hear you, not just the interpreter.
- Practice with the interpreter ahead of time whenever possible. Speaking through an interpreter can be very confusing at first.
- Give any scriptural references to the interpreter ahead of time so that he/she can be ready to read it in Spanish. [More on Giving Your Testimony](#)

Evangelism, Prayer, & Home Visitation Ministries

This will be one of the highlights of your mission trip! You'll actually walk the dusty streets like Christ did, sharing the Gospel, praying for people, visiting them, and on occasion, going inside their homes to see how they live. The people of Mexico really love to be prayed for as it's often their only hope. Each person in your mission team will get a chance to participate in these ministries and will themselves be changed as well.

Visiting people where they live is the most authentic form to minister to them. It's often a forgotten item in our busy, hectic lives, but as someone has said, "You can impress people from a distance, but you can only change them up close." While serving in Mexico, you'll return to this time-tested, Christ practiced, method of ministering to people.

You'll participate in this ministry in several different formats:

- **Sunday Afternoon**

You'll kick off your week of ministry on Sunday afternoon with an Evangelism and Invitation time in the community in which the church you'll be serving at is located. Your Mexican brothers and sisters in Christ (from the church you'll be serving at) will go with you to share in this time. You'll hand out Bible Tracts, share the Gospel, and invite the community to the activities you'll be doing during the week. Everyone from your group is invited to participate in this rich time. We'll divide your team into groups of 4-5 people per group. Each group will be led by one or two of your Mexican brothers or sisters in Christ from your specially chosen church you'll be serving with in Mexico.

- **Monday - Thursday**

During the weekday mornings, from 9:00-12:00am, about half of your mission team will break up into smaller groups consisting of about four or five people and will go with one or two members from your specially chosen church you'll be serving with to visit homes to evangelize, pray for the people, get to know them, see how they live, encourage them, and share Christ with them. Much of your prayers will involve praying for sicknesses as medical treatment is expensive, poor in quality, and as a result, God is often their only hope. During the week everyone from your team should try to get the opportunity to participate in this special time. You will also hand out Bibles to homes not having one and give away gospel tracts as well. [More on evangelism & prayer ministries](#)

Dress Code Guide

While in Mexico, we'll need to ask a few favors of your mission team. Perhaps the most important one involves dress. Please be aware that the people in Mexico are much more conservative and traditional than in the U.S.A. Therefore, please don't wear extreme type clothes or dress in a way that would cause undue attention to you. To be effective in missions, we must respect the Mexicans while in their country. The first and most important mission principle to understand about missions is that "We must set aside our dress and customs and adopt those of the country in which we are serving." The following info is not intended to judge anyone, just give some helpful guidelines so your mission trip can be as successful as possible.

Keep in mind that you will be involved in a variety of activities: church, work, travel, etc. The weather can be somewhat warm during the day and cooler at night (during winter and spring). During work construction times, it's not wise to wear sandals or open-toed shoes, however, it can be helpful to have a pair of sandals or slip-ons for going to the showers or night trips to the bathroom.

Here are some helpful guidelines to make your ministry most effective:

For Everyone

- Avoid a sloppy appearance, please
- Be governed by a sense of modesty, please
- No extreme clothing, please
- No body piercing jewelry, please
- No extreme T-shirts or hats, please
- No extreme hair color, please.

For Ladies

- No suggestive clothing (i.e. tight or form fitting shirts blouses or dresses, short shorts, half-shirts or anything that shows the tummy).
- A dress or skirt/blouse is a must for church (no sleeveless tops).
- Jeans or long capris may be worn during work projects and VBS.
- No shorts may be worn to any ministry activity.
- No excessive jewelry is suggested as the Mexican children might want you to give it to them or might break it.
- Sweatshirt or warm jacket is recommended for the cool evenings (wintertime months: December - March)
- No low cut necklines on dresses or shirt, please
- No strap-type shirts allowed, please

Gentlemen

- No excessively baggy clothing, please
- Jeans may be worn to church
- Jeans may be worn during work projects and VBS's.
- If your ears are pierced, leave the earring(s) at home, please.
- A sweatshirt or warm jacket is recommended for the cool evenings (during spring and winter months).
- No tank top T-shirts, please

Please understand that we don't ask these things to be legalistic or to deprive you of your individuality. It's just that particular appearances don't say the same thing in Mexico as they might in the U.S. The people we are serving are looking at us from their cultural lens and point of view. We must not damage our impact by allowing material things to get in the way.

Suggested Clothes to Bring

Work Clothes (For both Men and Women)

- Old Jeans
- Old shirts
- Work gloves
- Work shoes
- Hat

Dress for Vacation Bible School Outreaches/Home Visitation & Prayer Ministry

- Men - Unless your work clothes are extremely dirty they can be worn to V.B.S. You will be playing and interacting with children in a fairly dusty environment so changing is not really necessary.
- Women - Pants are fine, no sleeveless tops, dress modestly. Keep in mind V.B.S time is outdoors and somewhat dirty. Don't wear your best stuff. It's also a good idea not to wear your jewelry to V.B.S. as the children will want you to give it to them or be distracted by it.

Dress for Church Outreaches

- Men - Nice jeans (or equivalent) and casual shirts
- Women - Dress or skirt that goes below the knees when seated.
- ***Note for the ladies*** - Please do not wear open sleeve tops to any events that involve being around your Mexican brothers and sisters in Christ. They dress much more modestly than those in the states.

Photo & Video Orientation Guide

Pictures and video will play a very important part in your mission trip. It will be the main way you'll remember your trip and report back to your church about all you have done. However, this important tool, if not handled wisely, can harm your work and the people who you'll be serving. Following are some suggestions that will help you use this important vehicle in a healthy manner:

- You'll want to be careful that you don't come across as a paparazzi show to the Mexicans you are serving. If a lot of pictures are taken at the same time, especially during the outreaches, you could be interpreted as being primarily tourists, or your mission trip is more about you and they are just a side show.
- Be careful during the Evangelism, Prayer & Visitation Ministries that you take pictures appropriately as well. It's best to take pictures and video after your visit rather than at the beginning. It's important a relationship is established first otherwise, they might feel like you just came to see how "bad" they have it and want to see their poverty. They might feel like they're an object you've come to see. However, after relationships have been developed, they will be honored and delighted to have you take a picture of them.
- VBS's are not as sensitive as the other ministries as you'll be working mainly with children. During the VBS playtime, you can take photos and then show them to the children on your cameras or phones. They love to see themselves and the setting is more of a fun time. However, during formal ministry times, we ask you to follow the above-mentioned suggestions.
- It works out good to have several designated media persons who can take photos and video during the outreaches. We would ask, however, that the media persons take photos and video in such a way as to not draw undue attention to their activity.
- When you are out and about as a tourist would be, and not in a ministry related activity, you can take pictures as you please.

We realize this places a burden on you as everyone will be excited to take photos. However, for the good of those you'll be serving, and so you'll have maximum ministry impact, we have established these suggestions. In some more severe cases, ministry opportunities have been closed because photos have gotten into the hands of some activists in the states and have caused problems. Some Mexican organizations, therefore, don't want to run the risk of being exposed and in some cases, are leery about allowing Americans to enter certain areas to minister. However, our ministry has a good reputation and with your help, we can protect it.

We thank you in advance for your sensitivity to this important area. If you have any questions, please feel free to ask.

Youth Outreaches

For mission teams who would like to add one or more Youth Outreaches to their week, they are welcome to do so. There are several options for how many, and when to do them.

Following are several options to choose from if you'd like to minister to the youth of Mexico

Option 1 - Do One Youth Outreach Sunday Evenings

This outreach is normally held on Wednesday evening in conjunction with the Church/Community Outreach. If you would like to add this outreach to your schedule then you can have part of your mission team involved in the Youth Outreach and the rest of your team involved in the Vacation Bible School Outreach, or have all of your team involved in the Youth Outreach and don't do a Vacation Bible School Outreach.

Option 2 - Do Two Youth Outreaches Sunday & Wednesday Evenings

These outreaches are normally held on Sunday & Wednesday evenings in conjunction with the Church/Community Outreaches. If you would like to add these outreaches to your schedule then you can have part of your mission team involved in the Youth Outreaches and the rest of your team involved in the Vacation Bible School Outreaches, or have all of your team involved in the Youth Outreaches and don't do Vacation Bible School Outreaches.

Option 3 - Do Two Youth Outreaches Monday & Tuesday Evenings

These outreaches are normally held on Monday & Tuesday evenings. For mission teams who choose this option, they generally don't do Vacation Bible School Outreaches as it fills up each evening with activities.

This is the General Format for the Youth Outreaches

1. Icebreakers & games - 20 Min.
2. Music - 15 Min.
3. Testimonies 10 Min. (2-3 Testimonies)
4. Teaching time - 30 Min.
5. Snacks 15 Min.
6. More games if desired 20 Min.

It looks somewhat like a youth group meeting, only dressed up a bit. If you wanted to do some drama or etc., you could. The costs for doing this outreach would include providing some snacks and drinks afterward if possible.

Generally, there won't be a lot of teens at these outreaches as churches in our area are smaller in size and the youth of Mexico marry at a much younger age than in the U.S.

Chapter 5 - Planning for Your Stay in Mexico: Get Ready for Mexico!

Mission Base Accommodations

Large, Safe Mission Base

Go Missions to Mexico's Mission Base is located about 4 hours South of San Diego, CA. The facilities are designed to accommodate short-term mission teams and can accommodate over 230 people in bunk-beds and over 500 people if camping is desired. The base is fenced, gated and very secure.

The Mission Base is located on 10 acres and has 4 separate facility tracts, each with their own kitchens, dining halls, meeting rooms, showers (with hot water), bathrooms (with flushing toilets), dorm rooms (with cushions on the beds), and parking areas.

Each short-term mission team will have its own lodging tract for its use while on the base. Teams don't share facilities or go to the same church. Each team is its own separate team, with its own lodging facilities, and going to its own specially chosen church.

Because the base has 4 separate facility tracts, we can host more than one mission team at a time which increases ministry impact.

The Mission Base is clean, fenced in, and safe. It is located in a serene setting with a distant view of close-by beaches. It provides the perfect place to retreat to after a full and rich day of ministry. Beaches are about a mile away. [More about beaches](#)

Each lodging tract is a little different in size in order to better accommodate different sized mission teams.

Here's a breakdown of how many dorms, showers, and bathrooms your team will have for its use on the mission base depending on your team's size:

Facility Track 1: (For teams of 40-80) Has 14 dorms, 12 showers, and 6 flushing toilets.

Note: For teams larger than 80, we combine two or more facility tracts together for your convenience.

Facility Track 2: (For teams of 30-50) Has 8 dorms, 10 showers, and 6 flushing toilets.

Facility Track 3: (For teams of 20-40) Has 6 dorms, 7 showers, and 5 flushing toilets.

Facility Track 4: (For teams of 10-30) Has 4 dorms, 6 showers, and 4 flushing toilets. You will need to bring your own sleeping bag, pillow, towels and personal items.

You will have the freedom to divide your team up as you best see fit regarding dorm assignments.

While on the mission base you will have electricity (normal voltage as in the states), hot showers, flushing toilets, meeting areas, kitchen, dorms, and play areas. You can feel secure that your group will be in a safe, fenced in area with no threats of any kind. Also, we as

missionaries live on the base and will be here at all times to host and accommodate you with any needs and concerns you might have.

Kitchen & Dining Facilities

The mission base has four large kitchens and dining rooms. Each kitchen is furnished with pots & pans for cooking, utensils, has two refrigerators, two stoves, coffee pots and other misc. items. We recommend that groups bring paper products for eating as this saves time and effort. We provide 5-gallon water jugs for ease of getting purified water.

Shower & Bathroom Facilities

The mission base has a total of 30 showers and 18 toilets. Each facility tract has its own bathrooms and showers. Showers are individual and private. You will need to bring your own towels, soap, and person items for showering.

Sleeping Accommodations

The mission base has dorm rooms that can sleep 6-8 (most sleep 8) people per room. The beds are bunk-bed style and have cushions. You will need to bring your own sleeping bags and pillows. [Click here for more on sleeping accommodation details](#)

Close-by Beaches

We have beautiful, sandy beaches that are about a mile away from the base. Plan to enjoy this rich treasure during your free time. [Click for more on our beaches](#)

Recreation Areas

The mission base has 2 volleyball courts, basketball court, campfire areas, Bar-B-Q's, large fields for games, and quiet areas!

Wireless Internet

For your convenience, the mission base has Wireless Internet throughout all the facilities.

Drinking Water

We'll provide 5-gallon jugs for your team to use. Drinking water can be bought at any local store for about \$1.00 for 5 gallons. The Valley of San Quintin is sunny year-round, and it's important for team members to keep hydrated. Every team member should have a personal water bottle with them at all times for drinking water and should use them when brushing their teeth etc.

Electricity

There is electricity available in all kitchens, dorms, bathrooms, shower areas, meeting areas and outside as well. Electricity is the same as in the U.S. No need for converters or special devices!

Security

The mission base is fenced and gated. It has plenty of room for parking vehicles no matter what the size. There is always someone on the base to watch and care for everything, and the gate is locked at night. One of the unique positives of our area is that it's not a border town, and we're located in a rural, farming area with no threats of any kind.

Laundry Facilities

For those wondering about laundry facilities, the mission base offers Mexican-style washing machines (washing by hand in sinks). However, there is a laundry mat about 5 miles away where clothes can be washed if needed. Most mission team members just do whatever washing they need to in sinks realizing that they're on a mission trip where life is a little rustic.

Mission Base Orientation Guide

Make Yourself at Home

While your here at the mission base, we want you to feel at home. From our viewpoint, it is yours for the week. The following guidelines are to help your group keep their environment clean for the week they're here. We don't view the ministry base as a hotel, but a place for you to stay and minister from. Therefore, we post these guidelines as suggestions. We aren't going to police or check everything on the list. This is a just a tool we provide to help you.

The following guidelines are what we normally go over with groups during part of their welcome meeting upon arriving at the mission base in Mexico. They are posted here so you can get a head start and understand more fully about your time here in Mexico.

The rules are not intended to take away from your time here, but just the opposite, add to it. We have found that groups get the most out of their trip by avoiding some potential problems. Some of the guidelines deal with your stay on the base, and safety while traveling to and from the base.

General Guidelines

- Please drive slowly entering and leaving the base, be careful of children and activity.
- Please drive carefully on highways, many in our area don't know how to drive, and there are slow moving vehicles.
- Please don't write on any walls, bunks, or furniture.
- Please keep the base clean by throwing all trash in trash cans.
- Please don't play in gravel areas, play games, etc. in the sand areas of the base.
- Please, no smoking at church, or around any Mexican (Mexican culture is very sensitive in this area).
- Please conserve electricity by shutting off any unnecessary lights, and shutting off lights upon leaving rooms (electricity cost about three times more than in the states).
- Please don't climb over fences or go on other people's property.
- Quiet on the base after 9:00 pm please.

- The main gate will be shut at 9:00 pm (unless other arrangements have been made).
- Please take care of the base by not slamming doors, or abusing things.
- If something isn't working or gets broken, please report it.

Showers

- Please take short, military showers as we're in a desert with little water. Get wet, shut off the water, soap and clean yourself, turn the water back on and rinse. Please conserve as much water as you can as water is scarce here.
- Please make sure showers are shut off when you're done.
- Ladies can use plastic tubs for shaving their legs.

Bathrooms

- Please don't put toilet paper or other items in the toilets. Put it in the trash can. Mexican sewers cannot handle toilet paper.
- If any toilets are leaking, or not working right, please let us know.
- Please make sure all water in sinks is shut off when finished.
- Please use your water bottle for brushing your teeth. Don't drink water from taps.

Dorms

- Please take care of the foam cushions on the bunks. Don't write on them, tear, or mistreat them.
- Please don't hang clothes on curtain rods in your dorms, or trees. Hang them on the clotheslines.
- Please don't sweep trash & junk from your dorm outside onto the patio. Dustpans are available for your use.

Kitchen

- Please don't put food scraps down the sink. It doesn't have a garbage disposal.
- Please separate trash into burnable and non-burnable trash cans.
- Please save your aluminum pop cans separately (they can be recycled).
- Please put all food scraps in the scrap bucket. We'll tell you where to dump them.
- You can use the tap water for washing dishes. No need to boil the water.

Chores

- Each day, between breakfast and chapel, there will be a few chores for everyone. The chores are located on the bulletin board by the kitchen. The leader, or someone appointed, can divide up the chores and rotate them as they see fit. By everyone doing a few chores,

we keep our environment clean and healthy. Thank you for your great attitude and cooperation. [Click here for more](#)

Health Concerns

- You're in a desert climate, drink plenty of water.
- Take your water bottle with you at all times.
- Don't drink water out of the taps; drinkable water is in the large water jugs.
- Please put caps back on the water jugs when done, this keeps them from getting dirty.
- Water jugs can be filled up at any store.
- Get plenty of rest.
- Eat healthy.
- Wear a hat.
- Put on sunblock.
- Wash your hands.

Staying in Contact with Your Loved Ones Back Home

There are several easy ways to stay in contact with your loved ones back home:

- The best way to stay in contact is via your own cell phone. However, in order to use your cell phone in Mexico, you'll need to make certain to have it pre-programmed prior to departure. Keep in mind, however, that even some pre-programmed cells still don't work in Mexico (Verizon). You might want to check this out with your provider to be certain ahead of time.
- We have Wireless Internet on the mission base that is available to the leaders, or to whom the leaders give permission. Please bring your laptop or device for Wireless Internet as unfortunately, our personal computers are not available for public use.
- We have telephones on the mission base that can be used in cases of emergency or urgent situations.

Also, keep in mind that while on a mission trip communication can be limited. Let your loved ones know that you might be in contact on a limited basis.

The Mexican phones below we usually answer in Spanish, but just talk in English, and we'll know what's going on.

For those of you back home, rest assured that your loved one is in the hands of God and the hands of Long Term Missionaries. We'll watch closely over them and will give them a well-rounded orientation meeting that includes some important tips on safety. There are also close-by hospitals for your peace of mind as well.

Health Insurance Questions

While we do not endorse any health insurance company, here are some organizations who have contacted us and offer health insurance coverage for short-term mission trips to Mexico.

We should mention that in regards to medical attention in the Valley of San Quintin, we do have several hospitals. One that provides free medical attention (does not offer major attention like complicated surgeries, etc.) and a Christian Hospital that offers more complete attention (they do charge a modest fee). In the event that you feel that medical health insurance is important for your group, below is some possible help.

Local Medical Care

- **Local Hospitals** - In our area, we have several hospitals that can help with medical care. One is a state run hospital and doesn't charge for medical care. It provides care for minor surgeries and would be the first choice for broken bones, sicknesses, and general care. The next is a government hospital that offers a little more care than the first, but charges for its services. We also have a Christian-run hospital that offers the best care and would be a good choice Appendix surgery, and more complicated care. It does charge, however, but would be about a twentieth of what the same care would cost in America.
- **Care Clinics** - We also have many local care clinics where minor injuries can be addressed.
- **Private Clinics & Doctors** - We have private practices as well that are available.
- **Go Missions to Mexico Doctor** - We have a close doctor friend who is available just for our use if needed.

Semi-Local Medical Care

- **Large Hospitals Two Hours Away** - We have many large hospitals located two hours away if needed as well.

San Diego Medical Care

- **San Diego** - Located about four hours north of us are many hospitals in San Diego for major issues
- **Air Lift Capabilities** - We have a local ministry that has the capability of air lifting people with severe injuries who would prefer treatment in the states.

Weather for Our Area of Mexico

Summertime Weather - April - October

Highs are in the 80's to lower 90's, summertime lows will be in the upper 60's and lower 70's. We're a mile from the ocean, so the temperature is moderate year round with pleasant cooling in the evenings.

Wintertime Weather - November - March

Highs are in the upper 60's and 70's. Lows are in the upper 40's and 50's. For those coming during the winter months, be sure to bring extra warm clothes for the evenings and an extra blanket. Buildings are not heated in Mexico so you'll need a little extra warmth for the evenings. We do have, however, portable heaters in the main meeting rooms of each lodging facility for your convenience if needed.

Chapter 6 - Safety Issues In Mexico & Parent Section

Some of you might be wondering whether or not it's safe to come to our area of Mexico. You could be a concerned parent, a prospective leader considering a mission trip, or a leader weighing whether or not to endorse your church's mission trip. The following info is statistically based and designed to help you assess the situation from a factual standpoint. It also provides a perspective from us as long-term missionaries, who live here year-round with our families.

Safety Issues in Mexico

Safety Facts about Our Area of Mexico

- Our area of ministry is in a rural, agricultural setting with no little or no safety issues whatsoever. We are not in a large city, but a farming valley made up of smaller communities.
- Your church group will be staying in a very safe, gated and fenced mission base where we as missionaries live. Your mission team will be well taken care of.
- We have a wonderful relationship with the local police and city hall, so they are always ready to help out if needed. They always keep an eye out for us and patrol our area regularly. We've never had an issue, but they're available just in case. In fact, they have sought out our ministry and have asked us to help them in helping the poor who come to them for food, clothing, blankets, housing needs, etc. It's our pleasure to help them and as a result, we have a special relationship with them. Please rest at peace knowing you'll enjoy the help of the local police if needed. Look at the video to the right to see more.
- Most of the issues in Mexico have occurred over 800 miles from our area and involve infighting among drug traffickers. They do not involve tourist or the common people.
- Mexico's murder rate has fallen sharply from a decade ago. The National Public Security System reports that in 2008, the most recent year with available data, 12 people per 100,000 were the victims of murder. In 1997, the number was 17. In the late 1980s, the murder rate hovered near 20, according to the National Statistics and Geographic Institute. From a factual standpoint, Mexico is really safer than ever.
- When comparing the murder rate per 100,000 in the larger cities in the U.S, you might be surprised to know what they are versus the larger cities of Mexico. New Orleans is highest with around 60 murders per 100,000, and the average, per other larger cities, is around 30 per 100,000. The border city of Tijuana (which you don't drive through when coming to our area, but use a bypass freeway to go around it) is just 13 per 100,000. It's actually 3 times more dangerous to visit Washington DC than Mexico.
- According to Peter Greenburg (a CBS International Reporter), there have been less than 20 occurrences of Americans being involved in any violence over the last 3 years. And these Americans were actually Mexicans who are also U.S. Citizens and involved in drug related issues. There have virtually been no incidents regarding tourist.
- The point of view from most of us who live in Mexico year around is that things have improved over the past several decades. Unfortunately, only the bad news gets out, and the good news is unreported. Here's the good news: the current president is working hard to

clean up Mexico. His administration has changed all the border officials and hired new, young, college educated people to take their place. As a result, there is now virtually no corruption and bribes accepted or allowed at the border crossings. You are treated professionally and with courtesy. There has also been a serious change among the police and as a result, there are also no bribes or abuses taking place in this area as well. The military is also patrolling the highways and providing security with checkpoints to help with this as well. In addition, there is a branch of the government called, "The Green Angels" who patrol the highways offering help to travelers who break down or need help. Things are really much safer than in past history. We who live here have seen big changes and feel better than ever about safety and travel in Mexico.

- Most of the incidents mentioned in the media are isolated and mainly take place at night or in questionable areas. The newest U.S. Travel Update for Mexico says to use caution when going to Red Light Districts. It also recommends going to recognized tourist areas. Other than that, it is not telling folks to stay away from Mexico, but to just use reasonable caution as with travel anywhere, even in the U.S.
- Contrary to what some might think, and the media portray, there are not people with guns randomly shooting at vehicles as they drive by. Virtually every incident is drug related and involves drug traffic infighting.
- The main highway you'll be using on your drive down is the major (and only) highway of the Baja Peninsula. Every day there are about 10,000 cars that use this highway, and there have been virtually no incidents whatsoever on this road.
- If Tijuana presents a problem, know that you will not enter Tijuana and will bypass the city altogether on a major freeway when driving south to our area. We use this freeway all the time and feel very safe. And once again, this freeway bypasses Tijuana, so there's really nothing to worry about.
- If even getting close to Tijuana is a problem, you can enter Mexico east of San Diego via Tecate. The highway is #3 and connects in Ensenada. Tecate is a small border town, and the road is quiet and peaceful.
- Mexico is very concerned about its tourism and is patrolling all its highways with additional police and soldiers to ensure maximum safety. The area is also patrolled by Green Angels who help tourist whose vehicles might break down and keep watch as well.
- It's also pertinent to say that some of the media attention has been made a little sensational (as the media tends to do) and blown out of proportion. The murder rates in Mexico have actually fallen over the past 25 years and are better than ever. However, because the type of murders is high profile, they are reported. In the past this wasn't the case, so what was not reported was not thought about.
- A good case could be put together from things that happen in Southern California (or other places in the U.S.) that it's not safe to travel there as well. We are all accustomed to small risk in life and coming to our area of Mexico is not a large risk.
- A number of years ago my folks visited us and brought their camper trailer. They were pulled over at one of the soldier checkpoints and thought they were going to have big problems. However, the soldiers recognized they had some loose lug nuts on one of their trailer tires.

They quickly jacked up the trailer, tightened the lug nuts and sent them on their way. Most people are very friendly and helpful in Mexico, even officials of the government.

- We've been hosting mission teams for 18 years (well over 450 total mission teams hosted) and have had no issues whatsoever. We are on schedule to host another 25 teams this year and foresee no problems whatsoever.
- We are long-term missionaries, who are in our 18th year living here. You will be well taken care of by us. If we thought your lives were in any way in danger, or things were even remotely out of hand, we'd let you know.
- We can also provide references of recent team leaders who have currently been here if you'd like to talk with someone other than us.
- During your time with us in Mexico, someone from our ministry will be with your team at all times and act as your host.

We have God's Promises to Protect Us as We Serve Him

- We serve a big God who has our days numbered! We're not going to die one minute earlier or later than He has determined for us. There's no safer place to be than in His will doing His work!
- We can be in the safest place on earth, but if God plans to take us home, we won't escape God and avoid death. In the same way, we can in the most dangerous place on earth and if it's not our time to go, no force on earth will override God's perfect plan for us.
- We have the promises of Psalm 121, which talks about God's promise to protect and watch over us.
- We have the examples of Saul, with the whole Israelite army, who tried to kill King David but was unable to do so because of God's protection over him.
- We have the examples of how God protected the Apostle Paul as he shared the Gospel everywhere and many tried to kill him, but were unable to do so because of God's protection.
- Scripture is full of how God watches over His own and protects them. It's a fundamental truth of the Bible.
- God actually is greatly displeased when we don't trust Him and give way to fear. Fear is Satan's greatest tool in stopping the spreading of the Gospel. Our lack of trust deeply displeased God and makes Him out to be a tiny God, who is unable to protect us.
- God delights in our faith, and we grow in the Lord as we exercise it. On the contrary, we stay small and our faith shrinks when we don't trust.
- Lastly, God says in 1 Timothy 1:7, that, "He hasn't given us a spirit of fear (or of timidity), but of power, love, and self-discipline. It's Satan who fills us with fear and scares us away from serving God. It's Satan's favorite tool because it works so well. Fear has stopped more people from sharing their faith and serving God than any other thing. God promises to be with us until the end of the age as we share the Gospel (Matt. 28:20). What a precious

promise! God also says, “That if He is for us, who can be against us?” (Rom. 8:31) Not one hair of our head will fall to the ground without God knowing it. And if He watches over the birds of the air, how much more will He watch over us who are involved in a mission trip fulfilling the Great Commission of sharing the Gospel?

It could be that your own auto insurance company will provide you with coverage, and you don't need a different company. Documents Needed for Entering Mexico

Since March 1, 2010, all U.S. And Canadian citizens - including minors - have been required to present a valid passport or passport card for travel into Mexico. While documents are not routinely checked along the land border, Mexican authorities at immigration checkpoints

approximately 20 to 30 kilometers from the border with the U.S. will often conduct vehicle and document inspections and will require valid travel documents. So in summary, all that's needed at this time for entry in Mexico is a valid passport. Your passport will also be needed for re-entry into the U.S. While the requirement to have a valid passport is stated, a valid birth certificate has been accepted without any issues. Mexico is much more flexible than the United States regarding documentation. It should also be mentioned that documentation is rarely asked for by Mexico. Nonetheless, it is highly recommended that some documentation be carried by all foreigners entering and traveling in Mexico. [More on documents](#)

Mexican Tourist Visas Info

The following info applies to our area of Mexico (Northern Baja).

Tourist Visas are free for visitors staying less than 7 days in Mexico and appear to be somewhat optional as to rather or not they're really needed. Our area of Mexico has been declared a "Free Zone" and visitors can stay up to 7 days without paying a fee for a Tourist Visa. If a Tourist Visa is obtained, then it must be mentioned that your stay in Mexico will be 7 days or less. Otherwise, they will give you a Tourist Visa that cost around \$25 dollars and lasts for up to 180 days. Mexico has different classes of Tourist Visas, and the only free one is for visitors staying 7 or less days in Mexico.

While Mexico has stated that these free Tourist Visas are needed, it appears they have no desire to make sure you have one. You will not be asked for a Tourist Visa from anyone and therefore seems to be somewhat optional. Mexico's greatest desire is that tourism grows and that you come down and spend your money to help their economy and needy people.

Mexico would like those who get the free Tourist Visas to drop off the stub of the Tourist Visa at their immigration office prior to leaving Mexico. However this can be a big challenge as finding the office, and then finding the border crossing from the immigration office can be complicated. Most folks choosing to obtain these free Tourist Visas don't bother dropping them back off at the immigration office as there's no penalty for not doing so.

If you decide to get Tourist Visas, then here's the way to do it:

- Just after crossing the border pull over to your right.
- Ask an official for the office where the Tourist Visas are obtained.
- Be certain to mention that your stay in Mexico will be no more than 7 days and ask for the free Tourist Visa.
- You will need your passport or original Birth Certificate.

Wait times for mission teams of 20 or more can be around an hour or more.

Passport Info

For Re-entry into the United States from Mexico

Following is information from the U.S. Department of Customs and Border Protection Agency regarding Passports needed for re-entry into the U.S.

- **Adults 18 and Older** - Passports are needed for re-entry into the U.S. at this time.
- **Minors 16-18** - Passports are not needed under the following condition: U.S. citizen children between the ages of 16-18 arriving by land or sea from contiguous territory and traveling with an adult supervised school group, religious group, social or cultural organization, or sports team, may also present an original or copy of his or her birth certificate, a Consular Report of Birth Abroad, or a Naturalization Certificate.
- **Minors 16-18** - Passports are needed if the above condition is not met.
- **Minors 15 and Younger** - Passports are not needed but recommended. An original Birth Certificate and photo ID (for students) is acceptable at this time according to the U.S. Customs and Border Protection Agency (see info below).

U.S. Department of Customs and Border Protection Publication

- **Children** - U.S. citizen children ages 15 and under arriving by land or sea from a contiguous territory may present an original or copy of his or her birth certificate (issued by the Vital Records Department in the state where he or she was born), a Consular Report of Birth Abroad, or a Naturalization Certificate. If the child is a newborn and the actual birth certificate has not arrived from the Vital Records Department, we will accept a Hospital issued birth certificate.
- **Groups of Children** - U.S. citizen children between the ages of 16-18 arriving by land or sea from contiguous territory and traveling with an adult supervised school group, religious group, social or cultural organization, or sports team, may also present an original or copy of his or her birth certificate, a Consular Report of Birth Abroad, or a Naturalization Certificate.
